	Qualified Energy Conservation Bonds (energy efficiency)	Qualified Energy Conservation Bonds (QECBs) are low-interest bonds available for issuance by state, local, and tribal governments to finance qualified energy conservation projects. Eligible projects are broadly defined, and may include energy efficiency retrofits in public buildings, green communities programs, and renewable energy production, among others. As of June 2016, Tennessee's remaining QECB allocation is \$26,936,095.	To apply, submit a proposal using the Request for Proposals Form. Pathway Lending	Energy Efficiency Loan Program (energy efficiency)	Pathway offers up to six years of financing for qualified energy efficiency and renewable energy projects to Tennessee local governmental entities, including municipalities, counties, school districts and other similar public agencies. All costs related to the efficiency measures may be financed, including assessments, design, equipment and installation. Any project that reduces utility consumption, across electric, gas, or water, may apply for financing through this program. The loans are designed to allow for energy costs savings derived from each project to provide the repayment of the loan. To be eligible for a loan, a governmental entity must have a complete third-party energy audit, assessment or vendor proposal that details estimated energy savings.
